

Superintendent's Message

Several years ago, Center Line Public Schools (CLPS) embarked on a journey that transformed our traditional educational structure into one that is significantly different. Our academies approach is so unique that Ford Next Generation Learning (Ford NGL)



has recognized only 3 districts in the state of Michigan and 60 districts across the country. CLPS, through its "Academies of Center Line" education, emphasizes academics, real-world career experiences, and foundational life skills.



CLPS has been recognized as a **Phase 5 Ford NGL Community**, the highest phase in Ford NGL's developmental roadmap. Districts achieving this phase have demonstrated that they have the educational structures in place for a high-quality academy program, focusing on the connections between academics in the classrooms and experiences with experts in the workplace and the community. Our partnerships with Ford NGL and the Macomb County Department of Planning & Economic Development, as well as several local businesses and professionals, have changed how we educate our students.

We use the words *Discover*, *Explore*, and *Experience* to explain our educational approach. Elementary learning opportunities are designed so that our youngest learners can **discover** the world around them and learn from experts in their fields. For example, while studying engineering technologies and the effects of balanced and unbalanced forces on the motion of an object, every third-grade student spent a week with a professional in their classroom discussing engineering and robotics. Those students then designed and built experiments and tested their hypotheses using foundation engineering strategies and basic robotic coding.

Our middle school educational foundation is designed around a student's natural desire to **explore**. Exposing students to a wide range of opportunities and experiences allows them to identify their likes and dislikes while learning about their personal skill sets, balancing difficulty levels while providing exhilarating and fulfilling learning experiences. A team of educators visited Akron PUblic Schools to continue developing our middle school academy experiences. The 6th and 8th grade programs will be in place this fall, and the 7th grade program will be implemented in 2025-26.

Discover Explore Experience

The high school journey includes guaranteed **experiences** designed to better prepare our students for life after graduation. All freshmen participate in a college visit and a career fair. Sophomores participate in at least one industry tour to learn how businesses function and what skills are necessary to succeed in that profession. Juniors participate in at least one job shadow experience in a profession of high interest. Lastly, our seniors participate in an internship or complete a capstone project in a profession of their choosing.

Another foundational complement to our academies approach to educating students is the emphasis of our **Graduate**Profile skills of collaboration, communication, critical thinking, and leadership. These competencies are the building blocks of learning as well as essential life skills; they are introduced in early learning in kindergarten, developed through all grade levels, and culminate in experiences designed specifically for our high school students. The articles in this issue highlight our education model Discover – Explore – Experience and the four Graduate Profile skills, providing a glimpse of these concepts in action in our schools. Please take a few minutes to review the articles, enjoy the photos, and learn more about Center Line Public Schools!

Center Line High School



enter Line High School has revolutionized its approach to education.

We have created experience-based learning environments that feature wall-to-wall career academies, also known as the Academies of Center Line. Our academy model provides personalized, engaging, and community-centered learning experiences for all students. Our two main Academies, Industry, Technology & Innovation (ITI) and Health & Human Services (HHS), each features four unique pathways for students to pursue. Students are also able to earn college credit and pursue pathway-related professional certifications.

Ninth grade students enter our **Freshman Academy** designed to support students as they transition from middle school to high school. Staff focuses on creating an emotionally-safe and academically-challenging environment.

During Freshman Seminar, 9th graders examine their personal strengths and interests while exploring our ITI and HHS pathways to help them make informed decisions regarding which pathway and academy to choose at the end of the year.

ITI Academy students can pick pathways in Engineering Technology, Innovative Art & Design, Business, Commerce &

Entrepreneurship, and Digital Design & Communication. Students in the HHS Academy can pick pathways in Health & Wellness, First Responders, Law & Justice, and Public Service. Through the development of small learning communities centered around these two academies, our students are exposed to a multitude of careers, industry skills, and potential employers through classroom speakers, industry tours, and job shadowing.

We have been recognized by Ford Next Generation Learning (Ford NGL) as a Phase 5 Learning Community. We welcome Ford NGL's support as we connect educators, businesses, and community leaders to provide our students with the 21st Century skills necessary to succeed in the workforce.






Future Teachers

Educational Careers is a CTE class in the HHS Academy, Health & Wellness pathway. Students are placed in classrooms three times a week. Like student teaching, this hands-on opportunity lets students put all they have learned into action.

Law & Justice

Sophomores from the Law & Justice pathway met with dedicated prosecutors, passionate public defenders, and esteemed judges at the Macomb County Prosecutor's office and also witnessed a live court case.



First Responders

Students in the First Responders pathway can become certified Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT)/Emergency Medical Responders (EMR) or Firefighters. EMT/EMR students work on skills such as scene safety, patient assessment, ambulance transfer, CPR, and trauma. Firefighting students have skills training in fire dynamics, personal protective equipment, building construction, rope rescue, fire suppression, building search and rescue, ladder rescue, forcible entry, and vehicle extrication. Special thanks to instructors from local fire departments for helping train and mentor our future firefighters!



JROTC

The mission of JROTC, part of the Public Service Pathway, is to encourage, prepare, and motivate young people to become better citizens and leaders as they take on roles of increased responsibility and accountability. Cadets participate in parades, formal and informal social events, and community service projects. Additionally, they gain an understanding of how to function effectively as a member of a team and embody the mantra of "service to others."



Wolfe Middle School



olfe Middle School is home to over 500 sixth through eighth grade students. Our mission is to create an educational environment that continually supports our students in their personal and academic lives. To that end, we work to develop the whole child, with the CLPS Graduate Profile skills underlying everything that we do. Each of those skills, including leadership, communication, and collaboration, has its place in our school, but *critical thinking* is the skill that is most central to quality education.

At Wolfe, we incorporate critical thinking into every classroom. Students work collaboratively with their classmates and teachers to develop "need to knows" and "driving questions" that direct their learning, giving all students a sense of ownership of their own education. Students also engage in PBL (project based learning) to

ensure that their learning extends beyond the classroom into real-world situations. Whether it is interpreting figurative language in ELA class, creating models of the eye in science class, or incorporating visual thinking strategies into art classes, critical thinking is the basis of everything that we do.

Like all the Graduate Profile skills, critical thinking is central to Wolfe's efforts to create a culturally responsive teaching and learning environment. Students apply critical thinking to navigate relationships with peers and the school community. Wolfe holds periodic grade-level family celebrations to recognize staff and students for outstanding performance in all of our Graduate Profile skills.

We recognize that students need assistance in navigating interpersonal interactions. One

additional way that we incorporate critical thinking skills is through conflict resolution, where we employ restorative meetings to address student choices and conflicts. All students are encouraged to employ critical thinking as they reflect on the choices they have made, increasing their capacity to constructively and positively address differences and become the best version of themselves.

Presenting...Africa!

Geography students created projects on African countries and landforms. Using a variety of resources including Google Earth to choose their topic along with the Graduate Profile skill of Critical Thinking, students researched information and presented their findings to their classmates in a news style format.





WEB: Where Everyone Belongs

In order to help smooth the transition from elementary to middle school, Wolfe employs Where Everyone Belongs (WEB), a program that welcomes sixth grade students entering middle school, pairing them with eighth grade mentor students who can assist our new-to-Wolfe students navigate the middle school experience. Mentor training occurs during the summer so they are well prepared to assist during Sixth Grade Orientation in August, and our mentors wear special shirts on the first day of school to indicate they are WEB leaders, able to assist sixth graders in opening lockers, finding classrooms, and otherwise adapting to middle school. WEB also hosts events during the school year to check on sixth graders and make sure their first year of middle school is going smoothly.

Sixth grade science class had an EYE opening experience! The students performed a cow eye dissection to investigate what makes cow eye anatomy the same/different from human eye anatomy. They also created 2D or 3D models to show how it is possible to see by including the conditions necessary: light, object, clear view/path, eye, optic nerve, and brain.



Light Studies

Students explored light sources and shadows including how the sun's position in the sky can cast a variety of shadows from an opaque object. What happens to light when it reaches a medium such as a prism? Why can light be different colors?



Crothers Elementary



rothers Elementary is located in Warren across from Veterans' Memorial Park. At Crothers, growing students academically and socially is at the cornerstone of all decisions we make. Our staff strives to build the skills today that will meet the challenges of tomorrow through culturally-relevant instruction, a balanced literacy approach to language arts, and needs-based learning opportunities.

At Crothers, every student has an opportunity to be a leader. In every grade, students learn that *leadership* means more than just being in charge or making decisions. Crothers' Pandas learn strategies on how to manage their time, act with integrity, persevere, and reflect on their choices.

Student Council = School Leaders

Crothers' fifth graders can take on a school leadership role by serving on student council. Student council members are elected by their peers and represent the voice of the students. They are responsible for planning events and projects throughout the year. Some events support the climate and culture of the building such as donation drives for the Care Closet, Kindness Week, and Spirit Days. Student council members also attend our monthly Parent Teacher Committee meetings to share information and coordinate efforts in supporting the school and community. Student council allows students to serve their peers and make choices about topics that are important to them.

Mentorship & Math Games

A major part of the Crothers school community are our Panda Family Time meetings. Once a month we get together as a school talk about what is going on, set goals, and celebrate our achievements. During the 2023-2024 school we have incorporated student leadership into these meetings through mentorship. After the school meets as a whole, younger students head back to their classrooms with a buddy from an older grade. Every kindergarten through third student has a chance play math games with a fourth or fifth grade peer. This activity combines the fun of playing a game with peer learning and cooperation. Most importantly, they are building a connection with another student that lasts the whole school year and beyond.



Roose Elementary



oose Elementary School is one of three elementary schools in Center Line Public Schools. Our Roose Rockets are provided with academic, social, and emotional skills that help them be motivated, respectful, and knowledgeable members of society. Leadership, collaboration, critical thinking, and communication are our Graduate Profile skills that all students focus on throughout the school year.

Each month, students participate in our Rocketeers program to practice each of the Graduate Profile skills.

Communication is an important skill that teaches students how to listen, respond, and understand each other

to reach a common goal. Students use this skill most days of the school year and are given many opportunities to communicate with peers, other grade levels, teachers, and staff. For example, Mr. Briguglio's third graders have learned the American Sign Language (ASL) alphabet. This is a tool they use to effectively communicate in the hall without talking.

Our school culture is centered on the belief that everyone brings their own experiences to school and that we all are best when we work together, learn from each other, and listen to one another. We continue to invite everyone together for after school activities that allow students, families, and staff to engage and make connections. Just like our motto states, everyone puts in an effort every day to be safe, responsible, and respectful. Go, Rockets!!!

Roose at the Board of Education



Effort, Everyone, Every Day

Ms. Henninger's first graders focus on positive communication. They start each day greeting each other with high fives, fist bumps, or handshakes during morning meeting. As a class family, they choose a goal for the day. They have been working with their writing partners and learning how to ask and answer questions so they can make suggestions and make their writing stronger. They also have been working with math buddies to find patterns of ten.



Peck Elementary



eck Elementary is the only elementary building located in Center Line, although it services residents of both Center Line and Warren. This brand new beautiful school was opened to students in January 2021.

Peck students meet in Peck-Pull Together groups each month to work on Graduate Profile skills. These teams are an intentional mix of students from each class so that students can collaborate with students they might not otherwise encounter. They also have the opportunity to build connections with teachers/staff members they might not have for class. The groups stay together year-to-year. Fifth graders graduate and kindergartners and transfer students are added, but everyone else stays together, which allows them to build trusting relationships within their Pull-Together group.

One of the Graduate Profile skills is Collaboration. Students studied famous and local

exemplars of collaboration. They learned about each collaboration

standard during an academic lesson. For example, a second grade class practiced collaboration when they were reading with a partner and talking about what they heard their partner read. Students gathered with their Pull-Together group to practice the skill in a fun way. Finally, we gathered in an all-school assembly to celebrate students who have excelled at the skill. Life is better when we work together; Peck students learn this important lesson early in life!



Collaboration with McLaren Hospital

Emergency Department residents from McLaren Macomb Hospital visited Peck to present on healthcare careers. Students learned who works in a hospital, different types of doctors, the training needed for each job, and the tools doctors use to help people. Students then had hands-on learning simulations: they placed organs on a body, took vital signs, set a broken bone, removed a bead from ears and noses, gave medicine through an IV to a mannequin, and used doctor tools to repair wounds on bananas. Thank you to these residents for providing such a wonderful experience!



Early Childhood Center



ur Early Childhood Center (ECC) will be moving to the Eve Kaltz Academy 21 and Special Programs Center on Engleman this fall!



At the ECC, children have a high-quality "pre-school" experience. The ECC has a Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP) for 4-year-old children, an Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) class for 3- and 4-year-old children with special education needs, and a Transitions program for younger children with special education needs.

The GSRP and ECSE programs use the Creative Curriculum, which has a series of extended "studies" that help students discover the world around them.

These studies include experiences in nine domains: social-emotional, physical, language, math, literacy, cognitive, science/technology, social studies, and the arts. For example, students might learn about the trees around them by learning the names of the parts of a tree, making leaf-rubbing art projects, reading stories about trees, going on a walk to identify trees, and other creative activities.

Field trips are taken periodically during the year. This year the children visited the Westview Orchards, the Center Line Public Library, Universal Lanes, Outdoor Adventure, and the Detroit Zoo. Additionally, the ECC organizes special family events during the year, including Fall Harvest Festival, Gingerbread Night, the Preschool

Family Dance, and Reading Night. Families are warmly invited to participate in these special activities with their

preschool children.

As students interact with the curriculum, they discover their own abilities and the joy of early friendships. It is a great honor for our staff to witness these discoveries each day!

Under the city ordinance pertaining to fireworks, you may only shoot fireworks off the day before, day of, and the day after any national holiday. It is illegal to do so at any other time. It is also illegal to shoot fireworks off in any City Park. Violators will be ticketed.

Fraud and Scams

The warm weather brings out the con-men and women. As the years pass, these individuals become more brazen and bold in their scams. Some of the more common scams include: reroofing your house, sealing the cracks in your driveway, checking the water and electricity in your home, and giving them some money for a larger sum later. The intent of these people is to steal from you. If they appear at your door without you first calling them, be suspicious. Never let them in your house. We tell our children and grandchildren not to talk to strangers. When it comes to scam artists, the same holds true for adults. If you become afraid, call a neighbor or 911 to make a report. Community involvement is a key to crime prevention in our city.





Pets

Your pets are affected by the heat of summer just like you. Be sure to leave plenty of water available to them. Never leave your pet or child in an enclosed vehicle when you are not present. It takes only a minute for temperatures to reach dangerous levels. Make sure your dog is properly licensed. Licenses are available from the Macomb County Animal Shelter. As responsible pet owners, you should abide by the city ordinance on dogs.

File for Life

File For Life is a program designed to give our Public Safety Officers necessary medical information about you in the event that you are incapacitated and cannot communicate with us. All you need to do is pick up the form at the Public Safety Department, fill it out, and keep the form in the File for Life envelope on your fridge. The form will contain basic medical information that would help our officers in the event that we respond to your home for a medical emergency. Our officers will go directly to the refrigerator, retrieve the form and use the information to help you.



Public Safety Tips

It is necessary that yard waste, recyclables and solid waste be placed at the curb no earlier than the evening before the scheduled pick up, and no later than 7:00 a.m., on your pick up day. Failure to place your waste containers during the required times will result in your containers not being picked up.

Solid Waste

ITEMS THAT WILL NOT BE PICKED UP: Household batteries, vehicle batteries, paint, motor oil and building materials.

Compost/Yard Waste:

April 1 - Nov 30

All yard waste including grass, leaves, plant materials, and brush are to be placed in containers no larger than 35 gallon receptacles clearly marked "YARD WASTE ONLY" or in brown paper bags. Yard waste in PLASTIC bags will NOT be picked up.





Blight

Our Ordinance officer will be taking an aggressive and proactive approach to blight in the city. If you have any problems pertaining to blight, contact the City and the ordinance officers will follow up on the complaint. Let's work together to keep Center Line a beautiful city.

This is as a reminder of the city's trash cart placement policies, and proper placement during winter snow events. Please note the following policies:

1. Under normal weather conditions.

If parking is allowed on your side of the street, you should place your trash cart on the street with the trash cart wheels against the curb.

- 2. **Under normal weather conditions.** If parking is not allowed on your side of the street, you should place your trash cart on the right-of-way at the curb, but not in the street. This reduces potential traffic flow problems and vehicle accidents.
- 3. **Under normal winter weather conditions. (One to six inches of snow).** Do not place trash carts in the street. It is recommended that trash carts be placed upon the driveway approach whenever possible; or placed on the right-of-way at the curb.
- 4. Under severe winter weather conditions. (More than six inches of snow). A snow emergency will be declared by the City. Remove all vehicles from the street (Vehicles not removed within eight hours of a snow emergency declaration may be ticketed and towed at the owner's expense). Do not place trash carts in the street. It is recommended that trash carts be placed upon the driveway approach where possible; or placed on the right-of-way at the curb.

Center Line Parks & Recreation, in cooperation with Warren Parks and Recreation, offers a curb-to-curb senior transportation service.

This service helps seniors and handicapped persons remain independent for life.

Please be advised that drivers are NOT allowed to leave the vehicle to assist passengers in any way.



Holiday Pick Up

Remember--solid waste, recycling and compost scheduled for pick up on a legal holiday will be picked up on the next regular business day. GFL Services observes the following holidays: Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day.

GFL provides the City of Center Line with excellent solid waste, yard waste, and recycling services for years. Rizzo Services is also providing the city with brush chipping services. Brush chipping will still be done on Wednesdays and will still follow the same guidelines for how brush should be put out for chipping. As a reminder, the guidelines are listed below. Large brush is defined as pieces of brush longer than 4 feet in length but not exceeding 10 feet, no greater than 4 inches in diameter and generated by the homeowner not a commercial company, single family homes only. It does not include branches or limbs greater than 4 inches in diameter, stumps or dirt balls.



- ☐ Please place large brush at the curb on Wednesday with all butt ends facing in the same direction, toward the street.
- ☐ Please try not to allow brush to extend over the sidewalk or the curb.

For the safety of workers, all branches with thorns must be placed in yard waste paper bags or containers or tied and bundled for collection under the normal yard waste program.

Remember, small brush will still be picked up on your normal garbage day. Place small brush in yard waste bags or garbage cans marked "Compost" or bundled for collection. Free compost stickers are available at city hall.

Pedestrian Crossing



Please keep in mind that we need to follow the rules of the road when it comes to crossing the street. A reminder that all pedestrian traffic must cross the streets at the intersections within the crosswalk. For your safety, our officers will be enforcing the law and you could be issued a traffic violation. We want you to have a healthy and safe summer.

Public Safety Tips

During Winter Advisories and Storm Warnings, the City of Center Line DPW and Public Safety Departments have already begun preparing its response to ensure that all roads in the community are safe and clear of snow and ice.

The following information is provided to the public, for the effective and efficient response by the City during and after a winter snow/ice event.

During a winter snow/ice event, if roads are slick and there is indication of additional accumulation, the DPW will apply salt to all intersections in the city to ensure those areas are initially safe.

City street snow plowing will begin only after 1.5" to 2" of snow has fallen, and will continue during the snow event until the snow stops falling and all streets have been cleared and salted.




Should the snow event be less than 1.5", the City will apply salt when conditions allow.

Should the temperatures drop below 17 degrees, road salt is not effective, therefore the City will only remove snow once accumulation hits 1.5", and apply road salt once temperatures rise above 17 degrees.



Residents and Businesses can help keep our streets clear by pushing snow from their sidewalks, driveways and approaches onto grass areas only, and not back into the streets. It is a violation of city ordinance to place any snow from private property onto a public street, by the property owner or their designated snow removal contractor. Property owners may be cited for any violations by them, or their designated contractor.

It is highly recommended that property owners refrain from removing snow from their driveway approaches until after the City snow plows have cleared the streets. Snow Emergencies will be declared by the City Manager. Residents should watch the Public Access channel for snow emergency declarations. Should a snow emergency be declared, parking on any city street is prohibited, and may result in vehicles being towed at the owner's expense.


